- Required for graduation
  - March 1<sup>st</sup> – ACT Plus Writing
  - A multiple choice test that measures English, Math, Reading, Science & Writing, reasoning abilities used to help predict college preparedness.
  - March 2<sup>nd</sup> – WorkKeys –Applied Math, Reading for Information, and Locating Information.
  - March 3<sup>rd</sup> – Michigan Math, Science, and Social Studies

- VII. Dual Enrollment** – Attend local colleges during Jr./Sr. year.  
Eligibility is based on PLAN /ACT scores.
